

There is also a wealth of practical information on map compilation, cartobibliographies, copyright and permissions, facsimile reproduction, and the evaluation of source materials. Appendixes discuss the benefits and limitations of electronic graphics and pen-and-ink drafting, and how to work with a cartographic illustrator. This book is a very straightfoward explination of what humanities scholars need to be aware of when using maps. As a history undergraduate this book has made me aware of many issues that I have never considered when it comes to using, creating and publishing maps as part of a scholarly or popular work. Although the technology section is a little dated, the information still translates well to today as software publishers still use default settings that may not be the best for humanitites students. A good "how to" that reads more like a conversation than an instruction manual.

I have met Mark Monmonier several times. I am a practicing cartographer. I own and have read about six of his books. This is by far my favorite of his. Some of his books fall a little flat and lose their way in my opinion. Not this one. Incredibly useful, this book is an overlooked gem. It packs more information in its approximate 200 pages than a lot of \$100+ textbooks on cartography do. A must have for a cartographer. It is showing its age a little bit, but like most good cartography texts, the concepts and principles laid out within remain timeless. Great book. Cannot recommend enough!
