

While this conception is technically correct, in The Hidden Lives of Brahman, JoëI André-Michel Dubois contends that it is misleading.Hidden lives of brahman become visible when analysis of Å aá …karaâ ™s seminal commentaries is combined with ethnographic descriptions of contemporary BrÄ-hmin students and teachers of vedĕnta, a group largely ignored in most studies of this tradition.
